Happy September MAMGA!

This summer, the Division of Juvenile Corrections (DJC) broke ground (literally) on The Grow Academy near Oregon, WI.



The Grow Academy is an alternative to juvenile incarceration where youth learn through an agriculturally-based educational curriculum and gain skills to successfully reintegrate into their communities. On a one

acre plot of land and indoor facilities, the teens are growing food, learning green job skills, and completing high school course work through the lens of gardening and environmental education.

Dane County UW-Extension and Community Groundworks are the two primary community partners providing the program with educational support. Since June, we have taught lessons on seed and plant anatomy, vegetable cultivation, water ecology, trees and forestry, and soils and composting. To complement and apply knowledge, we have worked with the youth on different projects including compost bin construction, vegetable planting and maintenance, cover-crop planting, rain barrel installation, produce harvest, and value-added food production.

Also, congratulations to Jonathan Davis, a student in the 2014 Master Gardener class, for being hired as the Grow Academy's new lead teacher!

Garden Reflections

Although fall is my favorite season, I hate to see the end of summer just around the corner. I have seen so many beautiful flowers this season thanks to the plentiful rain and sunny weather we experienced during the summer of 2014.

I seemed to have lost my touch for growing tomatoes. Last year I had a poor crop and likewise this year. For years I

grew my tomatoes in large planters and I would have dozens of tomatoes. I guess I'll try that again next year!

I worked the Horticulture Helpline today and learned about



Goldenrod Soldier Beetles from an email that Lisa left for the plant health advisors. I am glad to have a name for an insect that has been frequenting my yard for years. They appeared to be harmless to my

plants and do not bite or sting so I've always just left them alone. I found out today that I was correct in my assessment of them. The beetles are harmless and especially fond of my anise hyssop plants as well as Queen Ann's Lace, milkweed rattlesnake master and other late summer bloomers. They are also very fond of mating with each other!

I know many of you are busy harvesting your crops and preserving your goodies for the winter. Good luck with that. I only go as far as freezing a few tomatoes for chili.

Plant of the Month

-- Eustoma --

Eustoma grandiflorum, commonly known as lisianthus, is a herbaceous perennial in USDA Zones 8 to 10 and can be



grown as an annual in Wisconsin. Prairie gentian, bluebell gentian or lisianthus is native to prairies and fields from northern Mexico north to

Colorado and Nebraska. Large gentian-like bell-shaped flowers up to 2" across with flaring petal-like lobes bloom in summer from the upper leaf axils. Garden cultivars typically grow 18-30" tall, although some dwarf varieties (to 6-8" tall) are available. Cultivars offer a broader range of flower colors including various shades of pink, blue-violet and white. Some double-flowered varieties are also available and do well in pots/containers for patios/decks or as houseplants. Leaves are ovate to oblong, 3-5 veined, stem-clasping and graygreen. Eustoma are excellent as cut flowers.

Eustoma can be easily be grown in average, uniformly moist, well-drained soils in full sun. Growing from seed can be rather


difficult because the seed is very small and takes about 5 months from planting to first bloom. If grown from seed, start seed indoors at least 10-12 weeks before last frost date. The dwarf varieties such as Blue Chip or Pink Rim will usually bloom sooner. Plant seedlings or purchased plants in the garden after last frost date. Pinch young plants to encourage branching. Eustoma will bloom from late June to frost.

Eustoma have no serious insect or disease problems but can be susceptible to viruses and stem cankers.



As long as they're handled gently and given time to cure, dry beans, garlic, onions, sweet potatoes and winter squash will keep for months in a cool, dry place — no processing required. Growing types that store for a long time, such as butternut squash and shallots, will allow you to eat fresh food from your garden all winter.


From the Bookshelf

<u>The Forager's Harvest: A</u> <u>Guide to Identifying.</u> <u>Harvesting and Preparing</u> <u>Edible Wild Plants</u>

<u>The Forager's Harvest</u> has many unique features that will appeal to naturalists, hikers, campers, survivalists,



homesteaders, gardeners, chefs, Native Americans,

and whole-food enthusiasts. The book contains a calendar of harvest times for wild produce, a step-by-step protocol for positive identification, an illustrated glossary tailored to the needs of foragers, a recommended reading list, plus special sections on conservation, safety, nutrition, harvest techniques, preparation methods, and storage. The book also contains detailed information on harvest, preparation, and storage techniques. A foraging calendar showing harvest times for wild foods and a glossary of botanical terms illustrated with line drawings are also displayed in the book.

About the Author - Samuel Thayer - is a natty dresser, he first led nature walks at 19 and besides wild food foraging, Sam is an all-around naturalist with particular interest in reptiles, amphibians, bird watching, botany, and mammals. His passion for wild food extends to studying the origin of cultivated plants and the socio-economic history of the human diet.

What's the Difference Between MAMGA, WIMGA & Certified Master Gardener Volunteers?

MAMGA, the Madison Area Master Gardeners Association, is a local non-profit organization of persons who have completed the basic Master Gardener training course, or are current students. MAMGA members may or may not also be currently certified Master Gardener Volunteers. MAMGA exists to provide education, service, and fellowship opportunities for its members. Membership costs \$15 per year. MAMGA members receive discounts at many local nurseries, participate in educational programs and garden tours throughout the year, and are invited to social events.

WIMGA, the Wisconsin Master Gardeners Association, is a state-wide non-profit organization of persons who have completed the basic Master Gardener course, or are current students. Most MAMGA members also choose to join WIMGA, but doing so is not required. WIMGA membership costs \$5 per year. WIMGA members receive periodic newsletters and other informational communications from the state master gardener office. WIMGA also hosts a statewide master gardener conference each year.

Certified Master Gardener Volunteers have completed the basic Master Gardener training course and have satisfied annual volunteer service and continuing education requirements. Most Certified Master Gardener Volunteers choose to join MAMGA and/or WIMGA, but are not required to do so. There is no cost to be certified as a Master Gardener Volunteer. Certified Master Gardener Volunteers assist gardeners through the local UW-Extension Office by serving as plant health advisors, answering hotline calls, tending the Teaching Garden, and performing various other activities that support the UW-Extension Horticulture Program and reach out into the community. Certified Master Gardener Volunteers also perform lots of other gardening outreach and service at places like University Display Gardens, Allen Centennial Garden, Olbrich Gardens, the UW Arboretum, churches, community gardens, and many other venues.
