MAMGA's Signature Project Lussier Prairie Update

MAMGA members and volunteers with Dane County Parks continue to remove invasives from the target area in order to encourage the survival of the seedlings we have planted. The prairie display of grasses and forbs is generally at its peak in September. The lack of rain means that plants will not grow as tall as they would with a more typical rainfall, but they will still provide a colorful display.

Work sessions are on Friday mornings from 9:30am to noon, with shorter hours on hot days. September workdays are on the 15th and 22nd. Drop-in volunteers are always welcome. Be sure to bring a sun hat, gloves, and protective clothing. In case of stormy or exceptionally hot weather, workdays will be canceled. Whooping Crane

The August 26 tour of the International Crane Foundation featured all the crane species (15) in the world. We also learned about the 75 acres of prairie that had been restored at the facility. Note that the black primary feathers are clipped on one wing to keep the bird within the facility. Breeding pairs mate for life. Whooping cranes are the most rare species in the world. Sandhill

cranes are the most numerous having made a remarkable recovery in terms of numbers. Generally, a crane's life expectancy is 20 to 30 years in the wild but in captivity with good care they can live from 40 to 60 years. Below: a pair of wattled cranes solemnly regard visitors.
